

How is Pupil Premium funding spent at Ditcheat Primary School in the year 2016 - 2017

Action	Impact
Additional TA hours to support Literacy interventions and intensive support with preparation for Big Writing	Over the course of the last academic year 2015/16, all of our pupil premium children have made progress in all subjects with one exception in writing in year 2. All children achieved Age Related Expectations (ARE) with the exception of one child in Reception in Reading and Writing, who is now on the SEN register and one child in Writing in Year 2.
Enrichment fund for each eligible child	The purpose of this money is to enable children to take part in activities outside school that may not otherwise have been possible (holiday sports clubs/music tuition/swimming etc.). Financial support has been available for families to support costs of residential trips.
Subsidise attendance at Early Birds and Ditcheat Extra	This support has enabled families to increase their working commitment leading to better financial security for the family as a whole. For some children attending Early Birds significantly improved attendance and ensured a settled start to the day.
Additional support for guided reading	Children are able to read in small groups 4x per week with an adult per group. All PP children made progress in reading in the year 2015-16. All children made ARE with the exception of one child in Reception who is now on the SEN register. The impact of additional support for guided reading has been felt at both KS1 and KS2 SATS for PP children.
Additional TA support in Willow and Cherry for PP children.	TA support targeted at Pupil Premium children provides specific support to PP children, but also enhances the learning experience for all.
Specialist equipment	Pupil Premium money has been used to provide IT equipment, Literacy resources etc.

Specialist 1:1 support provided by Higher Level Teaching Assistant (HLTA)	This enables specialist support to be provided for PP children, including; Speech and Language, Social Skills and Nurture.
Courses for staff to support specific	This support has enabled staff, who support PP children, to receive regular and tailored training.
